Greg Gaffney, Pastor of Worship & Music

The worship leader's responsibility is to lead others to an understanding of God's revelation and then help them shape a response. This is best done in the words and comfort zone of the people, not the worship leader's or that of the leadership of the church. What is good at one church may not be right at another. We should build on history while recognizing the changing culture around us. The best of both old and new should be used to help us shape our worship.

It is also important for us to recognize that there is more than one indigenous culture for us to deal with as the church. There is the culture within the walls of the church which is most directly impacted by our use of arts in the service.

But there is a **second culture**, the one immediately **outside our walls**. Our sensitivity to that culture will determine the ability of that culture to come within our walls and understand what they are seeing. If the hypothesis set forth by the writer Sally Morganthaler in her book Worship Evangelism, as well as by other authors and theologians, that the act of worship is the best form of evangelism is true, then the ability of the seeker to recognize what they observe will be determined by the impact of our art in communicating to them in a manner they understand.

This is a common theme concerning worship in the New Testament. The call for orderly worship presented by Paul and the writer of Hebrews is made with an assumption that unbelievers will witness our worship and that we need to be sensitive that they understand that which they observe. (Understand that there is a big difference between being seeker sensitive in our worship and being seeker driven.)

Then, just to make things more complicated, our post-modern world has created a third indigenous culture both within and outside the walls of the church, that of the emergent worshipper who values experience over words. The worship leader needs to be aware of all these cultures as worship is planned, a task that cannot be met by merely imitating the success of another church!

So enjoy your preferences AND embrace those of others, but above all, WORSHIP!

HYMNS OR CHORUSES. WHO IS RIGHT???

I have been following with interest the discussion concerning hymns, hymnals, and today's worship music that has exploded again on social media. I am saddened to see the rush to judgment that both sides of the debate often have with one another. Instead of trying to understand the breadth of expression with which God has gifted us, we throw down a gauntlet and limit our worship language to the limited vocabulary that we know (and love) well. The problem with doing so is that we forget the importance for each one of us to be able to express worth back to God in a language we know and we also then don't grow in our ability to expand our expressions of praise to Him. Ultimately, when taken to the extreme, we make corporate worship about our preferences and thereby make ourselves the central object of worship!

I am not saying that one side or the other is wrong. It's not having a preference that is the problem. When we, no matter what our personal preferences are, don't listen to one another and demand our preferences over others, are wrong!

I was thrilled to be asked to speak to Janet Neidhardt's women's Bible study last month as they studied hymns and hymnody. It was great being with a group of people who want to know what they are offering up in worship! Being with that class reminded me how so much of our argument on worship is based on personal preferences or experience rather than on a historical and even more importantly, Biblical understanding of worship music. Which is why their study was so important.

One of the things we talked about was how culture is so influential in shaping our worship preferences. We also looked at how we have a limited view on the historical truths of worship, how the hymn as we know it is really a relative phenomenon compared to the musical styles and formats that the early church knew. Our understandings of harmonies and style weren't allowed in the church worship of the middle ages! So when we rebel against using anything from the culture of today, we actually revert back to the culture of yesterday that we know, but that form wasn't accepted by those who came before us either.

I know that is a convoluted sentence, but if you think about it long enough it'll make sense... maybe! The other side of the coin is when we only revere the sounds and styles of today and dispose of that which came before us, we lose a great repository of theology and expression that is ours to own as the historical church!

Culture in itself isn't bad or good, and we need to recognize that worship is influenced by culture. But it should never be defined by culture! In the Nairobi Statement on Worship and Culture, a document forged over years of study by Biblical scholars, there is a recognition that worship and culture will and must interact, but in four different ways.

Our worship should be:

- 1. **Trans-cultural** recognizing that the basic tenants of Christian worship are unchangeable and above any cultural expression. Those tenets include:
- a. the centrality of the Word as the foundation of Christian understanding and world view
- b. the honest prayers of God's people
- c. the proclamation of the full Gospel
- d. the celebration of Lord's Supper and Baptism
- 2. **Contextual** recognizing the unique genius of the culture in which it is placed; speaking directly to that culture and arising naturally from the people of that culture. In other words, allowing culture to shape our expression so that it is natural and easily understood in our culture.
- 3. **Counter-Cultural** recognizing we need to resist aspects of the culture that detract from deep, Gospel-centered celebrations. These things in and of themselves are not an issue until they become the centerpiece of our worship, distracting from our true object of worship, our Lord Himself.

Some of these aspects <u>could</u> be:

- a. Technology
- b. Material Wealth
- c. Constant Noise
- d. Individualism
- 4. **Cross-cultural** Incorporating elements, prayers, and music that a given community receives as gifts from Christians in other places and other times. This broadens our worship language and helps us to have a greater understanding of Whom we are worshipping.
